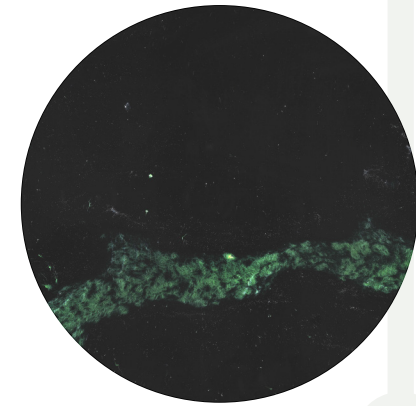

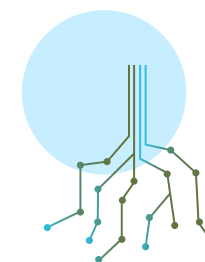
Green Soup describes the history of cyanobacteria consumption. The earliest record of cyanobacteria use dates from the Aztec period, more than three hundred years ago. Nowadays some species of cyanobacteria are widely considered to be a superfood and in space research cyanobacteria are considered a potential food supplement during space travel. Through the development of science and technology we have entered what geologists (and others) refer to as "the Anthropocene". But we are still afraid of death and find ourselves increasingly obsessed with pursuing vigor and life. Green Soup explores this using cyanobacteria as a narrative tool.
